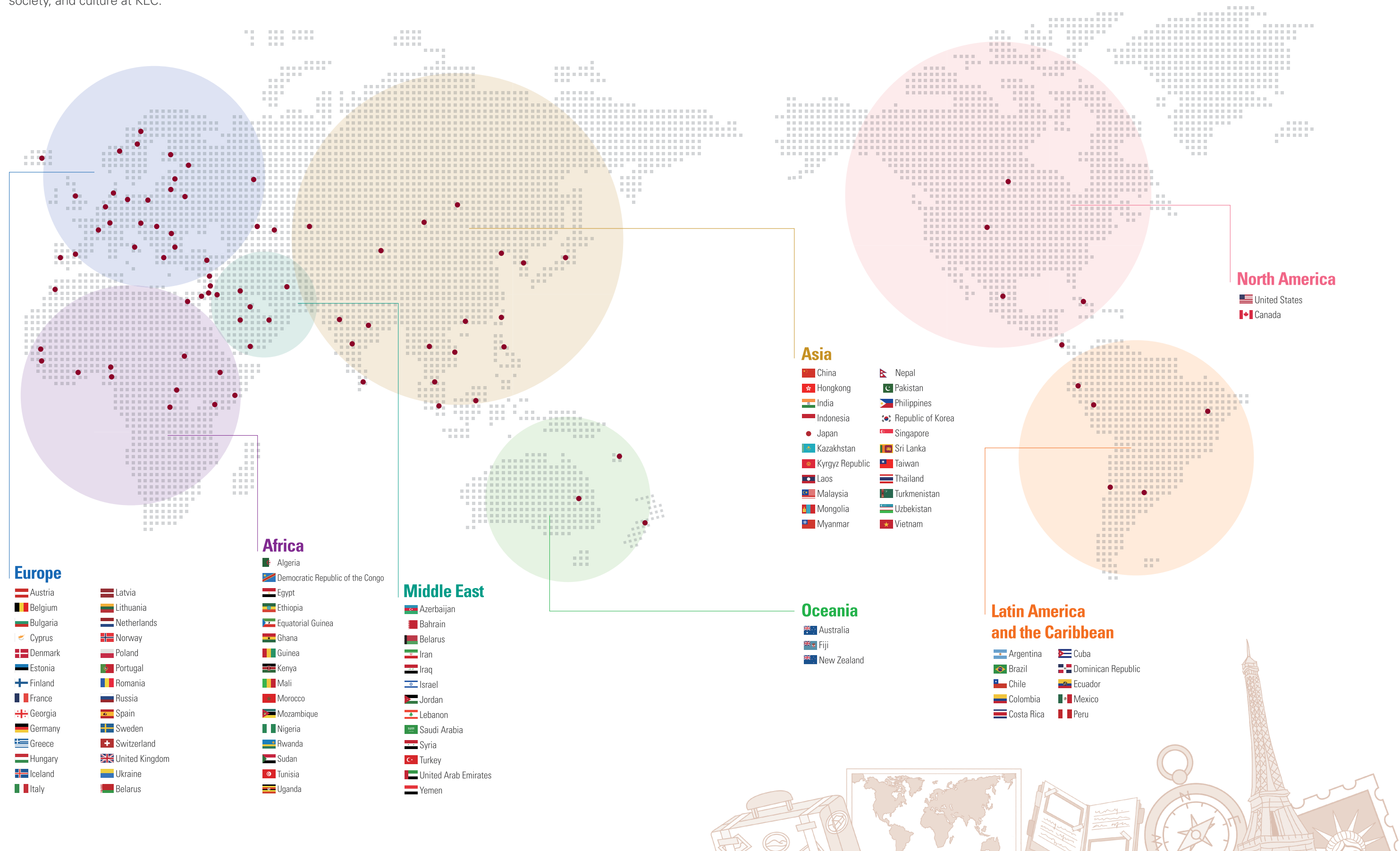

## Advantages of the KLC

### ◆ Distinguished Faculty Comprising Experts in Korean Language Education

KLC has more than 150 professional Korean language instructors.

### ◆ Curriculum Tailored to Individual Needs

The KLC conducts one-to-one placement interviews with every new student to assign them to classes that are appropriate to their Korean proficiency level. The KLC's tailoring of the curriculum to learner proficiency levels allows students to learn the Korean language and Korean culture more enjoyably and effectively.

### ◆ Cultural Experience Programs and Events

#### Hello Summer! Party

The Hello Summer! Party is organized by the center and includes performances by KLC students, allowing them to showcase their hidden talents and have fun with their friends and teachers.

#### International Korean UCC Festival

International festival where foreigners and overseas Koreans interested in Korea and the Korean language create user-created content (UCC) in Korean and compete for prizes.

#### Field Trips

Field trips are off-campus activities for students. Every semester, the center organizes various activities such as visiting famous tourist attractions and watching a show which give them the opportunity to broaden and deepen their experiences of Korea and of life.

#### Selective Cultural Activities

Selective or voluntary cultural experience activities are offered to KLC students every semester. Activities like kimchi making, temple stays, and museum visits are great opportunities to enjoy Korean culture more intimately and enjoyably.

### ◆ Student Support Services

#### Student Helpers (Doumi)

The KLC offers the Doumi (Buddy) Program which students can get help from those who are currently enrolled in Korea University in relation to living in Korea and learning the Korean language.

#### Multilingual Counseling Service

KLC offers student counseling services in English, Chinese, Japanese, Vietnamese, Russian, and Mongolian for KLC students at the beginner level of Korean.

#### Letter of Recommendation

For KLC students who wish to enroll in Korea University's undergraduate school, their homeroom teacher will write a letter of recommendation and provide admission counseling which includes information on the university to which a student wishes to apply.

#### Visa Agency Services

For the convenience of its currently enrolled students, the KLC offers an immigration consultation service which helps them take care of practicalities such as alien registration and visa extensions without visiting the Immigration Office in person.

#### Psychological Counseling

The KLC offers a psychological counseling service which assists students with their adaptation to campus life and helps them with stress management.

### ◆ Student Clubs

Student clubs allow KLC students to understand and enjoy Korean culture more fully, as they can participate in various club activities such as Samulnori, Taekwondo, K-pop singing and dancing, and Korean cooking.

### ◆ Facilities

#### Korean Education Building

The KLC's facilities include the Open Library, the Study Room, the Auditorium and the Club Room, as well as an outdoor terrace and a data archive.

#### Korea University Campus

Anyone who is enrolled as a KLC student can also use various facilities at Korea University such as the three libraries, Centennial Memorial Hall which offers multimedia facilities, and Central Plaza which has numerous convenient facilities for students.

### ◆ Location

The KLC is located in Seongbuk-gu, which has been recognized as one of the safest areas in Seoul in terms of crime, according to the 2022 National Local Safety Index published by the Ministry of the Interior and Safety of the Republic of Korea (based on a December 15 press release from the MOIS).






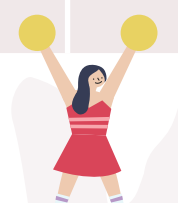
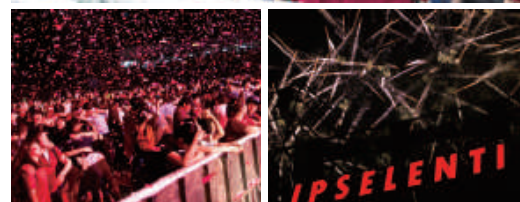

\* When there is a tie, the selection will be made based on attendance rate and academic attitude, and only those enrolled for the next semester will be eligible.

\* Immediate family members of current students, siblings or spouses who sign up for the same term, or children of Korea University employees and alumni are entitled to a 10% reduction of the tuition fee, if they submit the verifying documents.





## Program Introduction

### General Korean Course



The course consists of classes from Levels 1 to 6 and Top-Level Course for advanced studies. Utilizing textbooks published by the Korean Language Center of Korea University, students learn Korean speaking, listening, reading and writing skills. According to their levels, they engage in speaking tasks including giving speeches, participating in interviews, and engaging in discussions. In addition, the Top-Level Course includes special lectures on a range of topics by experts from various fields in Korean society.

### Academic Korean Course

The Academic Korean Course, offering classes from Levels 1 to 6, is designed for students who intend to enroll in undergraduate or graduate schools in Korea. This is an intensive course which allows students to learn more about terminology used in the academic setting that is additional to what is taught in the General Korean Course. By increasing the precision of their language use and assimilating academic language skills, students can prepare themselves for TOPIK (Test of Proficiency in Korean) and for studying at the university of their choice. The course also provides a university entrance and admission consulting service.



### Online Korean Course



The Regular Program, which is the core program of the Korean Language Center, is available online. The class environment is different, but all the contents such as the placement test, lecture, assignment, and evaluation are identical as the offline class. The online course follows the curriculum of the general course. It is a real-time video class, and you can ask questions, give presentations, and receive feedback from your teacher just as in the offline class environment.

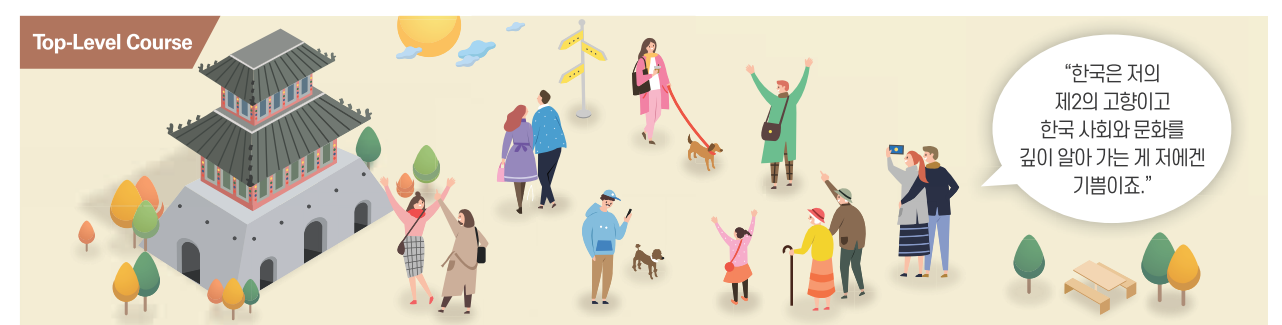

## Korean Language Teacher Training Program

### Program Introduction

- Three terms per year, with 120 credit hours required for course completion.
- Evening courses (spring and fall terms), and daytime courses (summer term).
- Candidates completing the program receive a certificate presented by the President of Korea University.
- Candidates completing the program become eligible for the Test of Teaching Korean as a Foreign Language (TOTKA).
- Candidates completing the program with excellent grades earn opportunity for the KLC instructor position.

### Step forward into the wider world with the Korean Language Center!

#### Rizk Mohammed Mahmoud Sayed

(Moma, Egypt)



- KU KLC student (Regular program Fall 2020 ~ Summer 2021)
- When at home in Egypt, works as a licensed tour guide
- Runs "MomaTours," an Egyptian travel agency for Koreans

Hello! My name is Moma, and I am a tour guide who runs a travel agency called "Moma Tours" for Koreans who are visiting Egypt. After studying Korean for the first time while majoring in tourism at university, and then working as a tour guide for three years, I realized that I had made enough progress in my Korean to understand the needs of Korean tourists. However, there were limitations to studying Korean in Egypt. There were fewer tourists coming to Egypt due to COVID-19, and I saw this time as an opportunity to study Korean more thoroughly. So I came to KU KLC to study Korean and after completing research class in the 2021 Summer semester, I went back to Egypt and am currently running "Moma Tours" again.



**Q Why did you choose to study at the Korea University Korean Language Center?**  
A. When I was searching for a good place to study in Korea, my Korean friends recommended this institution, so I did not hesitate to contact Korea University. The staff kindly answered all my questions, and I liked how the document submission process was simpler than at other institutions.

**Q What is it like to learn Korean in Korea?**  
A. The Koreans that I met in Egypt praised me for being fluent in the language, so I thought that I was good at speaking and that I would get a perfect score in the oral placement test. But contrary to my expectation, the teachers pointed out issues with my pronunciation and intonation. Despite being able to get my meaning across, the way that I was using the language was quite different from how Koreans actually speak. For me, who was disappointed with these problems, my teachers explained my shortcomings and gave me courage so that I could study my best.

**Q Please briefly tell us about your job in Egypt. I think it would have changed a lot before and after COVID-19.**  
A. I'm still working as a guide in Egypt. I have liked working as a guide since before the COVID-19, and the situation is getting a little better these days so the number of Korean tourists visiting Egypt is increasing. My Korean has improved a lot, so I'm working as a guide and as a translator too.

**Q What are your plans for the future?**  
A. I don't have much time these days to study Korean since I am working as a guide in Egypt. If I have a chance, I wish to go to the Korean language center to study again. I miss my teachers and class friends so much.

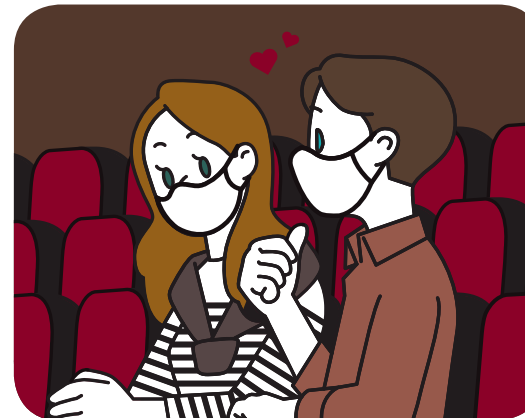
I actually enrolled for a weekend course (11am~2pm), but since the online course is based on Korean Standard Time, students residing abroad have to take classes according to Korean time.
